THE NICOSIA CONVENTION: A CRIMINAL JUSTICE RESPONSE TO OFFENCES RELATING TO CULTURAL PROPERTY

National Library, 15 - 16 June Riga, Latvia

DRAFT CONCEPT NOTE

Background of the Conference:

Latvia attaches great importance to the protection of cultural heritage and the prevention of illicit trafficking, damage, and destruction of cultural property. This objective is also an important priority for the Council of Europe (hereinafter, CoE), which in 2017 opened for signature the Convention on Offences related to Cultural Property, known as the <u>Nicosia Convention</u>. This criminal-law treaty is the only legally binding instrument aimed at preventing and combating such crimes by strengthening criminal justice responses and, at the same time, fostering international cooperation. At the occasion of the Presidency of Latvia to the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe, an international conference on the adequate criminal justice response to these phenomena will be organized in Riga on 15 and 16 June 2023.

The current situation in Ukraine, where cultural heritage has been deliberately targeted and looted artefacts may be illegally exported, unfortunately brings a renewed interest on protecting cultural heritage from damage and/or destruction. That situation highlights the relevance of the Nicosia Convention, in the responses to the offences relating to cultural property in conflict and post conflict situations.

Crimes against cultural property are a distinctly global problem requiring global solutions. It is accepted that the alienation and destruction of valuable artefacts affects everyone insofar as cultural property is not only the legacy of individual countries but also of humanity as a whole.

It is urgent to deal with this concern given the links between cultural property offences and organised crime and terrorism. Policing the illicit flow of cultural heritage across national boundaries requires a high level of co-operation between all relevant states and actors. Consequently, joint efforts must be made to set up the mechanisms by which countries can share information, learn from each other's best practices, and achieve better law-enforcement co-ordination to prevent and combat these offences. As a leader in legal co-operation, the CoE benefits from a well-established network in Europe and beyond, and decades of experience creating international policy. As such, it is uniquely placed to promote a co-ordinated approach to the fight against cultural property offences. It is in this context that the Presidency of Latvia is hosting a conference which will bring together representatives from international organisations as well as relevant national authorities. By working together, these representatives have the opportunity to improve international co-operation and thus provide an evergrowing level of protection to the world's cultural heritage.

Aims of the Conference:

The aim of this conference is to advance the fight against the offences related to cultural property by promoting the Nicosia Convention and increasing the visibility of the work being done by the CoE in such field. The main objectives are as follows:

- 1. to encourage states to sign and ratify the Nicosia Convention;
- to share the views, concerns and approaches of the different stakeholders that participate in the fight against illicit trafficking and destruction of cultural property;
- to discuss the benefits and challenges in ratifying the Council of Europe Convention on Offences Relating to Cultural Property, known as Nicosia Convention;
- 4. to highlight the importance of national and international co-operation in facing emerging challenges in this field;

Target Audience:

The target audience of the Conference includes policymakers, government experts, representatives of the justice and culture authorities, law-enforcement authorities, judges and prosecutors, customs agencies, NGOs, members of relevant international and European institutions and organisations, academics, as well as other cultural stakeholders working in the field.
