Meanwhile, in my own work on freedoms of thought and opinion, I have repeatedly met with scepticism from those who say that these are not "real" rights deserving of protection, either because there is little jurisprudence or writing on them, or because their parameters are too difficult to define. It follows that I am thrilled that you are considering the scope and protection of freedom of thought, and the challenges that it is facing from modern technologies. Placing guardrails around our mental autonomy in the face of emerging technology is vital to our future as humans. We need a line between permissible persuasion and assistance on the one hand, and impermissible manipulation and control on the other.
